Shared Life for a Shared Mission

INTRODUCTION:

As Christians, we are the body of Christ; we belong to each other and are to be deeply involved in each other's lives. As religious people, we have a unique opportunity to live in a radically counter-cultural way infused with Jesus's love. Living in a religious community and sharing God's mission with others opens doors to godly companionship, a richer spiritual life, and a countercultural witness to God's goodness. Shared life in the religious community is outward-looking and centred on Jesus rather than an inward-looking and exclusive one. It seeks to include and serve others unconditionally. Spiritual maturity, confidence in others, and a mutual commitment are necessary to honour God and maintain a shared life for the shared mission.

Ongoing accountability is vital in shared life for a shared mission. Being transparent and in deep relationships with one another calls for a Gospel way of living religious life. One of the wonderful things about sharing each other's life journeys is the big blessing that has come from sharing the mission of the community and being able to support one another. Our Constitution Article 63 states that our mission comes from the saving initiative of the Father who calls us to participate, as an apostolic Salesian community, in the Church, to share in the prophetic, priestly and kingly ministry of Christ by witnessing life, proclaiming the Word, and rejoicing in Salvation. The life of the first Christian community is the best example of a shared life with a shared mission: 'All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need' (Acts 2:44-45). Let us reflect on some of the significant aspects in fulfilling the shared mission of the community.

1. Sharing is Caring

"Sharing is caring" is a common expression that emphasises the positive connection between sharing and kindness or caring for others. Sharing is a rewarding experience, and it shows the kind of person one is. Sharing strengthens relationships, deepens connections and creates a sense of belonging. It builds a stronger missionary community communion. When sisters share resources and support each other, it creates a more connected and cooperative environment in the community. It is a noble and beneficial act that one can positively impact oneself and others by sharing what one is and has. The more one shares, the more one cares.

Sharing is a fundamental building block of strong relationships, a cornerstone of cooperation, and a key to a more fulfilling religious life.

Sharing is caring; it is a tangible way to show someone that we value their well-being, and it fuels progress. Sharing our time, energy, skills, resources, and challenges fosters a sense of collective well-being. Article 63 highlights that by the very fact of being a member of a specific community, every FMA is commissioned. Each one, no matter what task has been assigned by obedience, lives her identity as a Salesian educator in communion with her Sisters, in the spirit of the *da mihi animas*. Volunteering our time to a cause we care about, mentoring a young person, or offering a helping hand to a sister in the community demonstrates passion and compassion for the mission and strengthens the fabric of community unity. The fear of loss or the desire for personal gain can create a reluctance to share. However, true fulfilment often lies in the act of giving oneself and sharing joys and sorrows, remembering, "There is no enjoying the possession of anything valuable unless one has someone to share it with." So, when we share, we are bringing true joy to others and ourselves. When we share and care for one another, we create a ripple effect of generosity and support.

2. The Power of Sharing Connects Us and Creates a Bond

Shared experiences are vital to building a deep connection in the context of relationships. Sharing life means loving one another, purely and simply, the way God first loved us: "We love because He first loved us" (1 John 4:19). God's call is the foundation for our love for Him and others. God's love is a proactive, initiating love, not a reactive one. He loved us first, demonstrating His love through the sacrifice of Jesus, and this love inspires and enables our love in return. Our life of love and faith in a shared mission invites us to share it generously and with gratitude, for the blessing and benefit of one another. Offering a helping hand, a thoughtful word, laughter, a simple smile, and even tears creates a deeper level of understanding and can foster a sense of community and belonging. When we share such experiences, we create a sense of "we" rather than "me", strengthening the bonds that tie us together.

Shared life for a shared mission means staying with... walking alongside... abiding... And it's what we're called to as believers and religious in the world and as Partners in Mission. Sharing the highs and lows of missionary life lets us tap into the river of grace flowing through our lives. One can identify it by the quality of the relationships between Sisters in the community, by the power of trust and by the wonder of generosity. The episode of the paralysed man and his healing (Mk 2:1-12) is the *result* of both a **shared life** and a shared life *in action*. The friends were on a shared mission for a sick friend who needed help. *He* had a need, so *they* had a need. When Jesus saw *their* faith, he said to the paralysed man, "Son, your sins are forgiven." When he saw *their* faith, the paralysed man experienced the miracle. It's the Spirit who leads people to find Christ, not us, but we can plant seeds in the fertile soil of communion, compassion and caring for people.

3. Cementing the Power of the Community's Shared Vision of the Mission

Shared experiences cement relationships together and create a foundation for living a witnessing life and building out an awesome vision of the mission. Shared positive experiences enhance our feelings of belonging, connectedness and sense of meaning. It is important to celebrate 'wins' together, cementing the power of the shared vision into the

mission of the community. We need to realise the power of shared vision and its effects in the fulfilment of the mission of the community. Sharing the vision of the mission in the spiritual, relational, and emotional domains of our lives with the Sisters in the community will foster and nurture genuine relationships. We consider the depth of the relationship when we consider the depth of the shared experiences of the vision in mission: A prayerful concern for the lives of the community members, moments spent together dreaming and visioning, working on both strategic and tactical initiatives together for the mission of the community... A shared mission incorporates the mission of individuals within a community. It defines the purpose which allows everyone involved within the community organisation to share their vision that addresses broader components such as community, social, and environmental elements.

For instance, sharing spiritual experiences connects us uniquely because we talk about the deep and meaningful transformations in our lives. Having a shared vision is a crucial aspect of a successful and fulfilling mission. It provides the foundation for a fulfilling and enduring relationship in the mission of the community. Let's explore how we can establish a shared vision of the mission that shapes the dynamics of a healthy relationship and a common framework for decision-making in view of the mission of the community, with overall compatibility.

• Trust as the Foundation of the Mission

Trust is the bedrock of any healthy relationship for a shared vision of the mission. When all the Sisters in the community hold similar core beliefs of the mission, there is a fundamental level of assurance that their decisions will align with the core values of the mission of the Institute. This trust forms the basis for open communication and sharing responsibilities with generosity. The trust in each other in all aspects of life is a beacon of hope in navigating differences and conflicts in the fulfilment of the mission of the community. It provides common ground to move towards common goals, respecting each one's specific place in the shared responsibilities. Additionally, trust reduces conflicts in the shared principles, favours mutual understanding, and fosters harmony and resilience in the collective fulfilment of the mission.

• Direction and Goals

Sisters with a similar vision of the mission tend to have similar life goals and aspirations, purpose and direction. This can drive harmony in a relationship, pursuing common objectives, planning future activities together, or working toward a vision of the mission. Understanding among the Sisters and laypeople in the fulfilment of the mission is a crucial aspect of a successful accomplishment of the mission. This makes the process significantly more straightforward, as all are more likely to understand each other's responsibilities and decisions when they stem from fundamental values. This more profoundly strengthens the connection between the members in the community, fostering a sense of unity in the mission of the community. During challenging periods, it can be a source of strength and resilience and give a sense of unity and mutual support.

• Moral, Ethical and Spiritual Alignment

In the face of ethical decisions or moral challenges, our shared mission ensures that we will support each other. This alignment creates a united front, allowing us as a community to face

external and internal challenges with spiritual strength and conviction. For instance, when setbacks arise, a commitment to transparency enables open discussions, joint decisions, and collaborative problem-solving, nurturing a healthy connection and integration into each other's social circles. When everyone in the community shares the common vision of the mission, forming bonds with each other and the significant people, life becomes simpler. A compatible commitment to the mission of the community promotes a sense of unity and cohesion within the broader socio-cultural challenges of the context. Constantly, we have to create a harmonious living environment that aligns with our vision, our mission and our life.

• Satisfaction and Success

When we are committed to being the best versions of ourselves, the shared vision of the mission tends to have greater long-term satisfaction and success. Mutual support and sacrifice act as a stabilising force, helping to maintain the bond between us and everyone in the community, even as individual interests and circumstances change over time. In this process, relationships are more likely to withstand the test of time and continue to thrive, because every day, everyone will choose to learn more, do more and be more while acknowledging their strengths and gracefully accepting their limitations. It is reaffirming that when we give our best, so does everyone around us. We can thrive in an environment with the highest standards set for ourselves and the best fulfilment of the mission, relying on each other for support, strategy and encouragement.

4. Ways to Establish a Shared Vision of our Mission

While a shared vision of our mission is vital, establishing it requires open communication, active listening, and commitment. Here's how we can do it:

- 1. *Communicate Openly*: Start by having honest and open conversations about your vision and dreams in the community. Share your perspectives and encourage your community members to do the same. Listen actively to understand their viewpoints, style and expectations.
- 2. *Identify Common Ground*: Explore areas where your commitment aligns naturally. These can be related to the specific sectors of the mission, ethics, spirituality, or shared interests. Recognising these commonalities can lay the foundation for shared values.
- 3. *Discuss Differences*: It's essential to acknowledge and discuss areas where you may differ. Instead of seeing these differences as obstacles, view them as opportunities to learn from each other and find a common path to journey together.

- 6. **Seek Guidance if Needed**: In some cases, it may be helpful to seek professional guidance, such as relationship counselling, to navigate differences and establish a shared mission of the community.
- 7. *Practice Patience*: Fulfilling the shared mission of the community with a personal sense of responsibility is a great achievement. Be patient with each other and

recognise that it's normal to evolve and adapt your views as your relationship grows with the community members.

CONCLUSION

The main benefit of a shared mission is that it fosters a sense of belonging to the community. This translates not only into increasing the passion and loyalty of its members but also enhancing innovation and creativity. When every sister feels part of the mission and the community that supports and accompanies her, it creates sufficient space to build community communion, live and share faith, grow in confidence, and share Jesus' values of the kingdom of God. We need to believe that we can achieve more and greater things when we collaborate toward our common goals, rather than compete. When we trust each other, we are more authentically ourselves, we take smart risks, and we achieve greater things collectively than as individuals. To do this well, we must trust in ourselves and in our capacity to succeed, take very seriously our responsibility in the fulfilment of the mission of the community, and realise that our success is due to mutual trust and acceptance.

In conclusion, sharing is a powerful force that fosters connection, propels progress, and creates a happier community and compassionate world. By embracing the spirit of sharing, we enrich our own lives, strengthen our communities, and pave the way for a brighter future for all. A shared mission supports a healthy and enduring relationship, providing a foundation for nurturing love and trust. It contributes to the overall satisfaction and success of our mission. However, everyone needs to participate in the mission of the community, belong to and engage with, co-create, or share with others, personal and social responsibility. A willing collaboration, as the latest organisational wave, must craft and implement a shared mission for smoother and successful sailing ahead. So, let's embrace the transformative power of sharing the mission, for in doing so, we truly demonstrate that sharing is caring.

On 5 August 2025, we celebrate a day rich in spiritual meaning as we commemorate our Foundation Day, the Foundation of the Institute of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians, the feast of Our Lady of the Snow, and the Dedication of the Basilica of St Mary Major. On this day in 1872, St Mary Domenica Mazzarello and her companions offered their wholehearted "Yes" to God with simplicity and trust, marking the birth of a congregation devoted to the education and evangelisation of young people, especially the poor and abandoned. The FMA Institute continues to shine as a beacon of Salesian holiness and mission in the style of Don Bosco. At the same time, we honour Our Lady of the Snow, a Marian title linked to a miraculous snowfall that led to the construction of the Basilica of St Mary Major in Rome, the oldest church dedicated to Mary in the Western world.

This sacred place reminds us of Mary's maternal presence in the Church's journey. Filled with gratitude and joy, we renew our fidelity to God and our Marian identity, asking Mary to guide us to be faithful disciples and joyful witnesses of the Gospel. Let us live the grace of the covenant and renew the joy of our "yes" for and with the young people, faithful to the spirit of Mornese (Cf. Cir No.1051).

On 6 August 2025, the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord draws us into the mystery of divine glory revealed on Mount Tabor. Jesus, in the presence of Peter, James, and John, was transfigured before their eyes, his face shining like the sun and his clothes dazzling white - a foretaste of the Resurrection. The voice of the Father resounded from the cloud: "This is my beloved Son, listen to Him." As we celebrate the Feast of Transfiguration, may we fix our gaze on Christ, allowing his radiant light to transform our hearts and renew our courage.

15 August 2025 is a day of double celebration. First, we mark India's 78th Independence Day, honouring the sacrifices of the many patriots who fought for the nation's freedom. Mary's Assumption is the crowning of a life fully surrendered to God, filled with grace and love. As Queen of Heaven, she continues to intercede for us, her children, and invites us to lift our eyes toward the eternal.

On 16 August 2025, we joyfully remember the birthday of St John Bosco, our beloved Father and Founder, born in 1815. His life was a profound gift to the Church, especially to young people. Through his cheerful spirit, deep faith, and pioneering educational approach the Preventive System based on reason, religion, and loving-kindness - Don Bosco transformed the lives of countless young people. His legacy continues to inspire educators around the world to accompany the young with love and wisdom. On his birthday, we thank God for the Salesian charism and renew our mission to serve and uplift the young with the heart of the Good Shepherd.

On 22 August 2025, we celebrate the Queenship of Mary, acknowledging her royal dignity as Queen of Heaven and Earth. This title is rooted in her divine motherhood and her unique role in salvation history. Mary's queenship is one of humility, service, and compassion. As she reigns beside her Son in glory, she continues her maternal mission of intercession and care for the Church. On this feast, we are invited to entrust ourselves to her gentle reign and to imitate her virtues in our daily lives, confident in her protection and inspired by her unwavering faith.


